

The Amazing Adventure of Bertha Benz and the History of the German Automobile TUESDAY | Feb. 22

The superb reputation of German cars is legendary: Porsche, BMW, AUDI, and Mercedes Benz have millions of fans all over the world and are synonymous with the quality and the success of German engineering. But hardly anyone knows that the history of the automobile's origin is, to a great extent, due to Bertha Benz who became the first person ever to drive an automobile over a long distance. Join German historian Anette Isaacs as she introduces you to Bertha Benz and her exciting and historymaking adventure of 1888!

The Golden Age of Spain, 1600-1700: Ribera,

Zurbaran, Velazquez and Murillo THURSDAYS | Mar. 3, 10, 17, 24 10:30 a.m. - 12 p.m. LOCATION: ED140 and Zoom



The legacy of Mannerist painter, El Greco, provided a significant impact on subsequent Spanish artists. From the late 16th century, Spain initiated a novel and inspired pictorial style (ca. 1600-1700). Painters Ribera and Velazquez traveled to Italy and there established an important connection to the Baroque. Zurbaran's introspective and haunting chiaroscuro produced a depth in the depiction of sacred images that rivaled Caravaggio's. Highly spiritual and vigorously religious, Murillo's restrained style enhanced the portraval of Madonnas that future painters of Mexico would embrace and emulate. Changes in the status of artists, the spectator's interactive, emotional encounter with the painting and the evolution of unorthodox approaches to venerated subjects articulate the contribution of Spain's Golden Age.

Soviet Russia: An Insider's Perspective TUESDAYS | Mar. 8, 15, 22, 29 1 - 2:30 p.m.

Presenter: Dr. Asya Pereltsvaig

What was life in the Soviet Union like? This class combines history lectures with an insider's view of someone born and raised in the USSR. The Bolshevik Revolution, followed by several years of civil war and foreign intervention, changed not only the political structure of the country, but its economy, its social fabric and even the nature of the most personal relationships among its citizens. In this course, we will consider the Soviet planned economy, its repressive dictatorial political regime and its imperial nature. We will explore why the majority of Russians today admire Putin despite a growing economic crisis, why they are so intolerant of homosexuality, why Russian women hate feminism, and other similar issues that perplex a Western observer. By evaluating the balance sheets of the last century of Russian history, we will ponder the future of Russia and its role in international affairs.

The Kingdom of Portugal -Achievements and Tribulations WEDNESDAYS | Mar. 9, 16, 23, 30 3 - 4:30 p.m. LOCATION: ED140 and Zoom

This course will give you an overview of the nearly eight centuries that Portugal was a monarchy. We will cover the four dynasties that ruled Portugal for almost 800 years, from its inception, to the era of discoveries, the loss of independence, the fleeing of the



Royal Court to Brazil, and the end of the monarchy in 1910. You'll learn about Portugal's history of adversities and accomplishments.

Often overlooked in traditional design and architecture courses, the women designers of the 20th century have had a profound influence upon the way we perceive, experience, and enjoy our built environments, interiors, and decorative objects. This class explores and richly illustrates the work and influence of such designers and architects as Julia Morgan, Elsie de Wolfe, Eileen Gray, Lilly Reich, Charlotte Perriand, Dorothy Draper, Ray Eames, Zaha Hadid, and others. Their lives and the beauty of their enduring designs are documented within the context of the social and political issues they faced, as they left their unmistakable imprints upon 20th century design.

The Swing Era "Jazz at Its Peak" MONDAYS | Mar. 14, 21, 28, Apr. 4 3 - 4:30 p.m. LOCATION: Zoom

Doing the Jitterbug, going to dance halls and loving big bands! During the 1930s and 40s, jazz became the most popular music in the country, and Swing music helped to define a generation during the years that gave us the Great Depression and World War II. Duke Ellington, Benny Goodman, Count Basie, Glenn Miller and more! Biographical information as well as learning more about what made Swing so popular will be presented through audio and video samples. Enjoy hearing music from the Swing Era by the greatest jazz artists of the time period!

The Great Memoir Writing Adventure WEDNESDAYS | Mar. 23, 30, Apr. 6, 20, 27, May 6 1 - 2:30 p.m. LOCATION: ED140

Presenter: Armen Bacon

Journey into the heart of your creative voice in this six-week memoir writing course. Together we will explore, discuss, share and celebrate life's extraordinary adventure. Discover the writer within, unleash lost and forgotten memories, and write your heart



out. Participants will stretch their writing muscles using experimental forms, micro/flash memoir, humorous essays, and family stories – ultimately creating a powerful self-portrait of words on the page.

Cognitive Biases: Why the Instincts That Kept Our Ancestors Alive Lead Us to Make Poor Decisions

TUESDAY | Mar. 29 10 - 11:30 a.m. LOCATION: Zoom



Presenter: Dr. Kjir Hendrickson

Despite the fact that the world has changed drastically, human brains have not evolved to any significant degree over the last 50,000 years. In trying to make sense of the challenges and problems associated with the modern world, we are in essence



running "new software on 50,000 year-old hardware," which leads to a variety of problems. Chief among these, the instincts that helped our ancestors survive - the tendency to assume that if one event followed another, the first caused the second - are often problematic in today's world. As we make decisions (what to eat, whether to get vaccinated for the flu, whether to trust a news article), we are literally battling with our instincts. In this class, we'll learn about a variety of cognitive biases built into the human brain and address how they negatively impact decision-making.

Quantum Physics TUESDAY | Apr. 5 10 - 11:30 a.m.

Presenter: Dr. Kjir Hendrickson

Join Dr. Hendrickson (an erstwhile quantum mechanic) for a sojourn into the strange land of quantum physics. This branch of modern physics deals specifically with light and very small particles, and you'll learn in this class that they behave very differently than familiar, macroscopic objects do! This is not a class in metaphysics - the philosophical examination of time and space - nor will we be dealing with quantum mechanics (the mathy, how-to side ct quantum theory). Instead, we'll be tourists admiring the view - no prerequisite knowledge of physics or math required!

Silent Heroes: An Important - And Long Overdue-- Look at the Resistance Movement in Nazi Germany TUESDAY | Apr. 5 3 - 4:30 p.m. LOCATION: Zoom

Presenter: Anette Isaacs

This crucial presentation looks at the relatively unknown and sometimes even forgotten heroes who often gave their lives in order to fight against the German dictator's brutal Nazi regime. Join German Historian Anette Isaacs as she pays homage to Sophie and Hans Scholl, Georg Elser, Baron von

Jane Austen for the 21st Century Reader -Persuasion MONDAYS | Apr. 18, 25, May 2 1:30 - 3 p.m.

Stauffenberg, the women of Rosenstrasse, and other

groups who made up the German Resistance.

Take a deep dive into Jane Austen's final novel, "Persuasion". This course will spend three weeks exploring the novel, its context during Austen's time, and what it has to say to readers in the 21st Century. Primarily focused on discussion, the course will also present information relevant to the Regency period to enrich the reader's enjoyment of Austen's most mature work. Participants are asked to have read through chapter 9 for the first class discussion.

The War in the Pacific MONDAYS | Apr. 18, 25, May 2 3 - 4:30 p.m. LOCATION: Zoom



Presenter: Dr. Bradley Hart

World War II was a truly global conflict involving dozens of countries and millions of people. This course will focus on the conflict in the Pacific, starting with Japanese aggression in the 1930s through President Truman's decision to drop two



atomic bombs. Participants will be encouraged to share their family stories from this set of important events.

Great Discoveries, Part II TUESDAYS | Apr. 19, 26, May 3, 10 10 - 11:30 a.m. LOCATION: Zoom



Presenter: Dr. Kjir Hendrickson

Science often teaches factoids unmoored from context, but we learn best through hearing stories. For example, did you know that the scientist who first accurately measured Earth's age was also directly responsible for the removal of leaded gasoline from the U.S. market? Or that one of the most important discoveries of the 19th century was the result of a "failed" experiment? This class explores the stories behind the science in hopes of understanding how and why it matters, and what has happened as a result. (This short course is not a part of a series, it just covers different discoveries.) Eichmann before Jerusalem - Insights into the Mind of a Mass Murderer

TUESDAY | Apr. 19 3 - 4:30 p.m. LOCATION: Zoom



Did he really just represent the "banality of evil" as author Hannah Arendt so famously expressed it? Or was he indeed a fanatical and utterly brutal Nazi, as recent historical research suggests? Join German Historian Anette Isaacs for a compelling discussion of the decade Eichmann spent in Buenos Aires, which will reveal crucial insights into the mind of one of the world's most callous mass murderers.

Art Nouveau: Beauty in Design

WEDNESDAYS | Apr. 20, 27, May 4, 11 10 - 11:30 a.m. LOCATION: ED140 and Zoom



The first truly international style, Art Nouveau emerged in the late 1880s among artists, artisans and architects who sought modern, universal designs that could enhance the everyday world. Inspired by organic, swirling forms, artists and designers explored the inter-



section between aesthetic expression, craftsmanship and functionality. Architects Antonio Gaudi and Victor Horta adopted new materials like cast iron and concrete. Czech artist Alphonse Mucha raised poster art to a new level. Art Nouveau furniture, jewelry and decorative arts challenged traditional distinctions between Fine Art and crafts. This course explores the wide-ranging creations of Art Nouveau from its inception in the 1880s through its waning around 1914.

Tyranny and Democracy: Past and Present

WEDNESDAYS | Apr. 20, 27, May 4, 11 3 - 4:30 p.m. LOCATION: ED140 and Zoom



Dr. Andrew Fiala will discuss the problem of tyranny, based on his new book, "Tyranny from Plato to Trump." Donald Trump is not the only President accused of behaving tyrannically. Similar accusations were leveled against Abraham Lincoln, Barack Obama, and others. Fiala will provide an overview of the history of thinking about tyranny and democracy in philosophy and in literature. This will include a discussion of solutions, as imagined by Plato and the American Founders.

The Golden Door: Passing Through Ellis Island THURSDAYS | Apr. 21, 28, May 5, 12 1 - 2:30 p.m. LOCATION: Zoom



U.S. Immigration to the United States can be graphed as an undulating landscape with twin peaks: the Ellis Island years at the turn of the 20th Century and the Hispanic-Asian immigration of today. The first shaped 20th Century America, and the second is shaping the future. Today's OLLI demographic is dominated by descendants of those who came through Ellis Island, the greatest numbers of whom were Italians and Eastern European Jews. We will look at what drove them to emigrate, their voyage, the confusion of Ellis Island processing, and surviving an unwelcoming America. But as every experience was unique, we also will share individual family stories of people in the class who want to participate.

the pain and suffering of the men of the 442nd Regimental Combat Team, one of the most decorated in American military history, and you cannot fail to be moved by what you read.





On August 13, 1944, Joe Moser set off on his fortyfourth combat mission over occupied France. Soon, he would join almost 170 other Allied airmen as prisoners in Buchenwald, one of the most notorious and deadly of Nazi



concentration camps. Tom Calvin's Lightning Down tells this largely untold and riveting true story.

The Kennedy Half Century by Larry J. Sabato

John F. died almost half a century ago-yet because of his extraordinary promise and untimely death, his star still resonates strongly. On the anniversary of his assassination, celebrated political scientist and



analyst Larry J. Sabato-himself a teenager in the early 1960s and inspired by JFK and his presidencyexplores the fascinating and powerful influence he has had over five decades on the media, the general public, and especially on each of his nine presidential successors. A recent Gallup poll gave JFK the highest job approval rating of any of those successors, and millions remain captivated by his one thousand days in the White House. For all of them, and for those who feel he would not be judged so highly if he hadn't died tragically in office, The Kennedy Half-Century will be particularly revealing.
