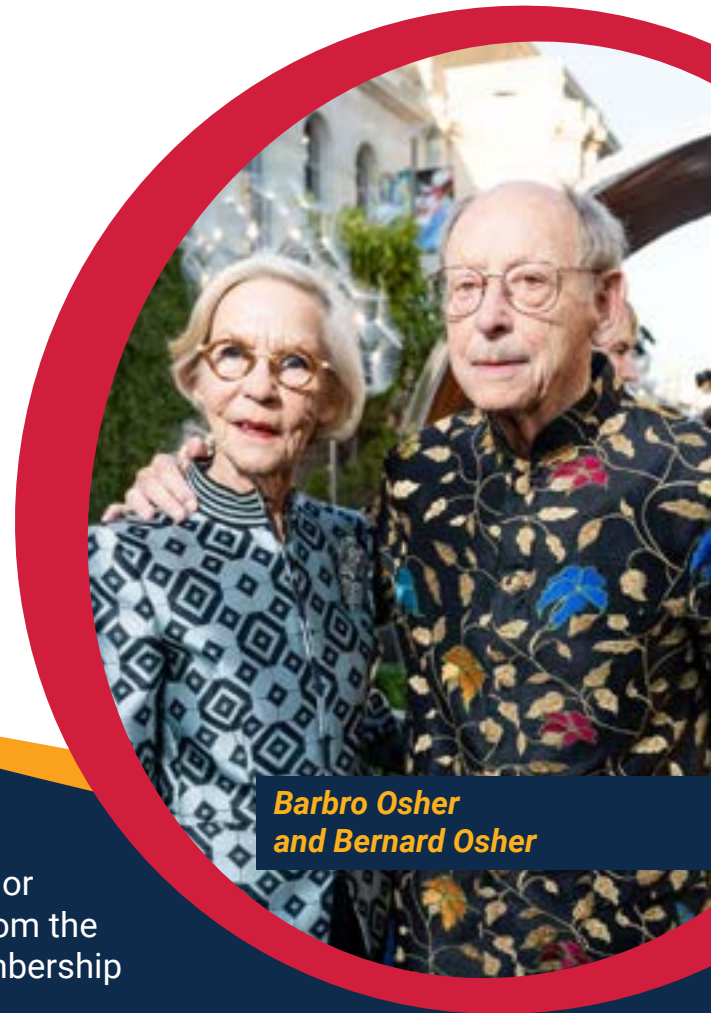

## Dr. Rashanda Booker

**Navigating Political Shifts: DEIB's Role in Modern Education**

In an ever-evolving political landscape, understanding and implementing Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Belonging (DEIB) practices in education is more crucial than ever. Fresno State Diversity Officer, Dr. Rashanda Booker, leads this interactive exploration of the impact of recent political changes on DEIB initiatives in educational institutions and provides practical strategies for creating inclusive learning environments. OLLI students will learn relevant terminology, engage in thought-provoking discussions, and gain an understanding of recognizing barriers to inclusion and collaborating across differences to increase productivity.



## Dr. Juan Felipe Herrera

**From the Poem to Happiness**

## Dr. Lisa Bryant

**A Brief History (and Explanation) of How Elections Work in the U.S.**

Elections are straightforward, yet complex; familiar, yet foreign. Nearly two-thirds of American citizens have cast a ballot at some point in their lives, but few know the details of how their ballots are processed and counted or how we ended up with the system we have. Fresno State Political Science Professor Lisa Bryant, a nationally recognized expert on election administration and science, will present a brief history of presidential and local elections in the U.S. and discuss the current era of election reforms. Dr. Bryant recently was selected as an Andrew Carnegie Fellow for her research project, *Polarizing the Process: Partisan Effects on Election Officials and Trust in Elections.*

**Alzheimer's Disease: Minimizing Risk and Maximizing Treatment**

An interdisciplinary panel of experts, led by Fresno State psychology professor Ellen Woo, will discuss Alzheimer's disease, managing risk factors, and what treatments are available. Dr. Woo will introduce us to the university's Brain Health and Sciences Program, whose experts in neuroscience study impairments in brain health that lead to difficulties functioning in everyday life. Because, underserved populations have a disproportionately higher prevalence rate of neurological diseases, the program focuses on the significant health, psychological, and economic impacts of such diseases in medically underserved Central California.

## Book Club

OLLI members have been reading a book a month since 2012 and discussing each title in a lively, informative session led by avid reader and educator Kay Davies. This time the list – which is selected by OLLI Book Club participants from fiction and nonfiction books they nominate – offers insights into the Palestinian-Israeli conflict; a little-heralded mid-20th-century woman who had major influence over American policies; pre-Civil War America; and the Vietnam War’s impact on American life.

**September 6: The Wager: A Tale of Shipwreck, Mutiny and Murder** by David Gramm is about an 18th-century shipwreck and two sets of crewmembers who told very different stories about what happened after they washed up on widely distant South American shores.

**October 4: The Lemon Tree** by Sandy Tolan details the long friendship between a Palestinian and an Israeli that endured despite the many historic twists and turns in the fraught history of the Middle East that resonate today.

**November 1: The Confidante: The Untold Story of the Woman Who Helped Win WWII and Shape Modern America** by Christopher Gorham tells the story of Anna Rosenberg, whose accomplishments include being President Roosevelt’s special envoy to Europe in World War II and being involved in the G.I. Bill of Rights and the Manhattan Project.

**December 6: James** by Percival Everett is a best-selling novel based on the runaway slave character “Jim” in Mark Twain’s “Adventures of Huckleberry Finn.” The novel – set decades before the Civil War – follows James’ efforts to get enough money to buy his wife and daughter’s freedom from enslavement.

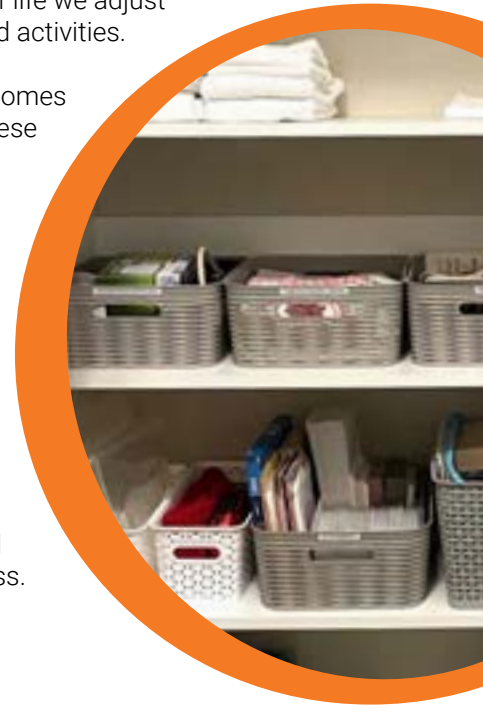

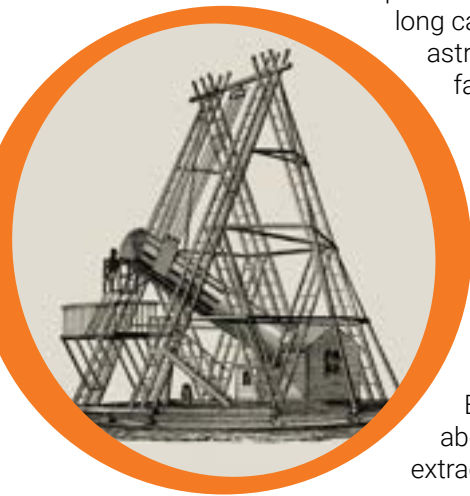


## The Herschels - The First Family of Astronomy

OLLI member and frequent presenter Larry Parmeter, an amateur astronomer and retired high school English teacher, will talk about the legacy of the entire extraordinary Herschel family.

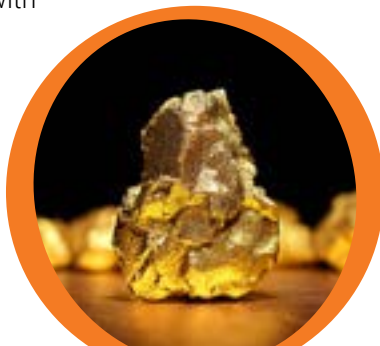


## The History and Mystery of the Color Yellow

In modern science, a biologist might offhandedly mention Gregor Mendel and his pea plants or a chemist casually toss a nod to Ernest Rutherford and his gold foil. We take for granted these fundamentals of science, once considered groundbreaking.
