# **Keynote Speakers**

California's Great Dilemma: To Grow or Not to Grow in a time of Wildfires and Climate Change?

**Mark Arax** 

Thurs., Sept. 18 | 3 to 4:30 p.m. Satellite Student Union

Award-winning journalist and author Mark Arax, a favorite Fresno State OLLI keynoter, will share his thoughts about a major challenge for California land-use planners: Balancing the need for growth against threats of climate change and wildfires. As weather conditions become less predictable, more people move into the state. They need somewhere to live, preferably with urban services that include fire and police protection, roads, affordable housing, utilities, waste management and water. Greater residential development in exurban areas, though, stretches urban infrastructure and services, adds to environmental concerns, and will require possibly painful solutions to guarantee a sustainable future.

# Non-Violence is a Weapon of the Strong

A trailblazer in global leadership and religious diplomacy, H.E. Bawa Jain has made a lasting impact from the United Nations to the World Economic Forum. Rooted in the timeless legacies of Mahatma Gandhi and Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., this keynote explores nonviolence as a bold and transformative force in confronting the world's deepest challenges. Far beyond passive resistance, nonviolence will be presented as a dynamic strategy for leadership—one that demands moral courage, inner strength, humility, and a commitment to justice. The session will call for a new generation of responsible leaders who lead with compassion, serve with humility, bridge divides, and act with the conviction that peace is not merely the absence of conflict, but the presence of dignity, truth, and shared humanity.

# Why Journalism Still Matters in a Distrustful World

The collapse of local news is eroding American democracy, but new models of journalism are trying to rebuild public trust and civic engagement. Disappearing newspapers and other media cutbacks leave behind "news deserts," where communities lack reliable, watchdog reporting. Former Fresno Bee Executive Editor Jim Boren, founding executive director of Fresno State's Institute for Media and Public Trust, will explore the need to preserve local journalism; the impact of its decline on democracy and civic life; and how nonprofit newsrooms, public media, and community-driven efforts – many in our region - are restoring trusted local reporting. This timely keynote also will teach us how to help meet this challenge.

# Table Knockers and Spirit Guides: The Victorian Spiritualism Craze

In the early 1900s, talking to the dead was almost as popular as talking to your best friend. Ouija boards, automatic writing, seances, and spirit parties were all the rage. Participants in these dubious activities included people who probably should have known better and many who just didn't want to lose contact with their dearly departed. Historian Micheline Golden, a popular Fresno State OLLI presenter, has been fascinated with early 20th century spiritualism since meeting a ghost on the Queen Mary. She promises a fun talk about that encounter and about ghosts, mediums, scams, and spirits – just in time for All Hallows' Eve.

### **Shadow Music the Sounds of Our Valley**

Listen as farmer and author David "Mas" Masumoto invites us to explore how the sounds of stories from family history can be told musically. We'll focus on four generations of Japanese-American farm women and their legacy of resilience through the melody of their lives – the disharmony of hard times and rhythms of working our lands. The themes are from his new book "Shadow Music" and the musical composition was inspired by his writing and performed by the Fresno Philharmonic. Words and music fuse to capture a community soundscape that feeds our imagination to understand our past, present, and future; expands our sense of place; and amplifies the power of the anthem of our lives.

# Who Is the Other? An Exploration of Cultural Beliefs in Our Valley

How can we be sure humans evolved from a branch of the Great Apes? If that happened, why are there still apes? How does one species give rise to another? Is evolution still happening? What's the "theory of evolution by natural selection," its origin, and how sure are scientists about it? Popular presenter Dr. Johnnie Hendrickson, a teaching professor in molecular sciences at Arizona State University, answers those questions and more as we examine evidence scientists use to understand evolution, speciation, and the variety of life. Besides examining ancient evolution, we'll explore how humans have continued to evolve since taking our modern form.

### **Pioneer Women of Fresno County**

What would history look like if written by women who lived it? Celebrated California author and local historian Dr. Jeannine Raymond gives us a glimpse through stories from her new book, Ernestine Winchell and the Pioneer Women of Fresno County, California. Winchell's first-hand accounts of life in late 19th



century Fresno County – written in the 1920s – attracted statewide interest and included interactions between indigenous people and settlers. We'll also meet the woman famous for research on dairy cows, learn the origin of the street name Minnewawa, and meet women who built prominent businesses, getting a better appreciation of what it took to cross the country by wagon, arrive in an inhospitable landscape, and survive.

# Surviving Genocide: A Survivor's Story

Regrettably, genocides around the world don't seem to stop, but only to relocate. Additionally, they often are told in the broad swath of numbers, rather than in the personal stories more likely to promote understanding and support. In this class, Dr. Amila Becirbegovic, an associate professor of German and Ethnic Humanities at Fresno State, will discuss the Bosnian genocide of the late 20th century, which she survived by escaping. She will help us understand why genocide happens, how ordinary citizens become perpetrators, and

what each of us can do to stop future genocides from happening.

According to the American Heart Association, nearly half of American adults 50 or better have diagnosed with cardiovascular or chronic disease. Medical



research proves that diet can have a huge impact on overall health and fitness. Diet affects many key elements of cardiovascular disease, both directly and indirectly: obesity, physical activity, cholesterol, sleep, and nutrition. While most well-publicized commercial diets have low success rates, we need a solid nutrition plan to manage potential late-life health liabilities. In this new OLLI class, we'll learn valuable, life-extending lessons from Gopal Kapur, whose Roseville-based nonprofit distributes meal boxes through food banks and other organizations that feed the hungry.

Queen Victoria and Prince Albert had nine children, 42 grandchildren, and 87 great grandchildren representing nine of Europe's royal houses leading into World War I. These marriages and children were (mostly) the result of marriages carefully orchestrated by Victoria herself to fulfill a plan created early in her own marriage. British history buff Micheline Golden, a much-requested OLLI presenter, is our guide to how the royal couple plotted to liberalize European monarchy and society by spreading their children and politics across the continent. We'll learn how WWI pitted cousin against cousin and also which children and grandchildren broke free to marry for love

### **Teddy Roosevelt in Yosemite**



instead of duty.

#### Presenter Dan Carrion

President Theodore Roosevelt traveled to California in May 1903 – less than two years after succeeding the assassinated William McKinley and 18 months before his own re-election in 1904. On his train trip West, Roosevelt visited many places throughout the West. But the signature event was a three-night camping trip in the Yosemite area with explorer John Muir. Fresno State Professor Dan Carrion, a favorite OLLI presenter who has studied local history most of his adult life, will help us understand how that meeting of two signature

men made an indelible mark on the United States. Before leaving office in 1909, Roosevelt oversaw the creation of more than 150 national parks, monuments, forests, and reserves.

### Van Gogh & the Rebels: How Post-Impressionists Ignited Modern Art

### **Speleothems**


