Putin's Russia: Two Years Into War

FEBRUARY 27 | Tuesday | 1 - 3 p.m. | ZOOM

On February 24, 2022, Vladimir Putin unleashed a war on the neighboring country of Ukraine, which has resulted in mounting military casualties on both sides and a civilian tragedy on the Ukrainian side. Nearly two years later, the war still rages despite continuing pressure on Russia from the West and the resulting economic hardships it has created. As Russia is nearing elections in March 2024, almost sure to renew Putin's presidency, we will examine why Putin is still in power and Russia is still at war, and investigate just how broad the popular support for Putin and his policies is in Russia and, most importantly, why.

In an effort to understand what happens to grief when days turn from weeks to months, years to decades, Armen and co-author Nancy Miller set out to explore how grief morphs through time. This book, an anthology of 28 modern-day survival stories, breathes new life into how humans navigate life after loss, ultimately offering readers a chorus of hope underscoring the resilience of the human spirit. Babe Ruth, Ty Cobb, and the Scandal that Came from the Valley

In the winter of 1926, baseball was rocked by a scandal. Sportswriters called it the worst to ever hit the game. It came, ironically, from right here in the Central Valley. That same winter Babe Ruth underwent a career-changing transformation. Many observers felt Ruth was nearing the end of his career. Reinvigorated, however, the Babe went out and in 1927 not only enjoyed the greatest season of his illustrious career but one which rescued the game. Former valley television sportscaster Dan Taylor chronicles this remarkable story in his new book *Baseball at the Abyss*. He will join us to talk about this never-before-told story.

The 1920s Ku Klux Klan in Fresno: A KKK Fiesta?

APRIL 2 | Tuesday | 3 - 4:30 p.m. | Satellite Student Union

At the close of the Civil War, the KKK was formed in Tennessee as a bulwark against what Southerners saw as Northern aggression and the imposition of Black rights. During Reconstruction, President Grant criminalized the organization, placing hundreds of KKK leaders in federal prison, sending the Klan underground in the South for decades. The 1920s witnessed a rebirth of the KKK, with a large membership in California. Fresno stood out as a hotbed of white supremacist sentiment and Klan activity. Dr. Fontes' talk explores specific events in Fresno Klan history during the first decades of the 20th century.

Symbolic of many things, such as power, status, and wealth, as well as love, seduction, and passion, the color red has been part of our color palette since the very beginning of

human history. This lecture will take us on a journey of women in art history who wore red, as well as explore how redheads were viewed in art and society through the lens of portrait paintings. We will also follow the creation of the pigment from crushed-up insects to chemicals and discuss how artists used the color to create an array of emotions in their paintings.

Between Normality and Terror. Everyday Life in Nazi Germany THURSDAY | Feb. 8 3 - 4:30 p.m. | ZOOM

Eighty-three years after the beginning of World War II, most of today's research is focused on the system of terror, established by the Nazis, that ultimately led to the deaths of millions of people. While we will discuss the role of

governmental surveillance and brutality—prominently represented by the secret police Gestapo and the SS—our seminar will first explore what daily life was like for ordinary citizens in 1930s Germany. By looking at various societal paradigms, such as education, employment, the role of women, and cultural expression, we will gain insights into how the German people were oscillating between normality and terror, and how the Nazis were able to turn Germany into a brutal and horrific dictatorship.

Artificial Intelligence for All Ages TUESDAY | Feb. 13 2 - 3:30 p.m. | ZOOM

It's time to get up-to-speed with Artificial Intelligence (AI) and learn how it can help improve our lives. In David's lecture, he'll demonstrate how to use AI to write and proofread email, create a meal plan, summarize a topic, and perform mundane tasks in seconds. He'll also talk about the limitations of AI including privacy, bias, ethics, and accuracy.

Civilizations Unveiled: A Comprehensive Study of Six Cultures Across Time, Space and Influence



Embark on a fascinating exploration of the evolution of cultures in China, India, Japan, Iran, Egypt, and Judea. This course delves into the intricate tapestry of these six civilizations, unraveling the impact of geological and geographic conditions, intricacies of race, and nuances of philosophy and religion. We'll discuss the story of family development, evolution of agriculture and manufacturing, dynamics of revolts and revolutions, prowess of military might, strides in science and inventions, and the rich fabric of culture that encompasses the arts, beliefs, and institutions passed down from generation to generation.

The Lahaina Fire: Almost Everything that Could Go Wrong, Did Go Wrong TUESDAY | March 5 1 - 2:30 p.m. | ZOOM



The disaster that was Lahaina resulted from a perfect storm of cascading natural events followed by a perfect storm of human failures. A series of natural phenomena - a hurricane well south of Hawaii, strong winds generated by corresponding high-pressure north of Hawaii, unusually dry conditions (likely caused by climate change), and unfavorable topography-combined to produce, in what is normally a wet, tropical paradise, one of the fastest moving wildfires ever recorded anywhere. Virtually every aspect of the human response turned out to be inadequate, inoperative, non-functional or simply bungled. Clearly, Hawaii did not learn the lessons that it should have learned from California over the years. The question now is whether and what can California learn from Hawaii.

Pints and Peas: Everything You Need to Know About the British Pub WEDNESDAY | March 6

This course will explore the magical and transformative power embedded in soil, seeds, and blossoms. Participants will embark on a journey that goes beyond the cultivation of plants to delve into the profound impact gardening can have on the spirit. Through thoughtful reflection, we'll explore the ways in which cultivating a garden can serve as a metaphor for personal growth and healing. The instructor will share many supporting examples of this in her work in the gardens at a prison. Come learn to embrace the therapeutic potential of gardening, fostering a connection to the Earth that goes beyond the surface and reaches into the very essence of the human spirit.

Philosophy of Religion WEDNESDAYS | April 3, 10, 17, 24 3 - 4:30 p.m. | ED 140

In this course, Dr. Fiala will lead participants on a journey through the philosophy of religion. This will include questions of theology (definitions of God, the problem of evil, and so on), as well as questions about what counts as religion and questions about the

status of religious belief. The course will engage these questions with an open mind, aiming to stimulate conversation. Dr. Fiala will provide insight into the theories of important thinkers in the history of philosophy while connecting the topic to current controversies.

A Visit with America's Only Emperor, Joshua Norton MONDAY | April 15 2 - 3:30 p.m. | ED 140

Joshua Norton, known as Emperor Norton the First, Emperor of the United States and Protector of Mexico, was a figure in San Francisco society from 1850 to 1880. Some said he was crazy, some said he was a drunk. Members will learn about the life of Emperor Norton, and about the legends and actual facts of his activities in San Francisco during this time. Many of his thoughts and decrees were far ahead of his time, and most of his ideas are commonplace today, even though they were ridiculed during his lifetime.

Marcus Pollasky: How the City of Clovis was Conceived MONDAY | April 8 2 - 3:30 p.m. | ED 140

This course will discuss the events around 1891 when Marcus Pollasky was actively trying to build a railroad through Fresno County into the mountains. Members will learn the myths and the actual facts about "Fresno's Bold and Brilliant Boy," the creation of Clovis, the building and aftermath of this railroad, and its ultimate impact on the Fresno area. The Baltic Countries: Lithuania, Latvia and Estonia TUESDAYS | April 16, 23, 30, May 7, 14 1 - 3 p.m. | ZOOM

The three Baltic countries are a beautiful and captivating, if often overlooked, part of Europe. Thanks to their location, the Baltic countries have long enjoyed a mild climate and trade links with Western Europe. While today they



England has had just six gueens regnant - gueens who inherited the throne and reigned on their own - and each has left her special mark on the country. Mary I, Elizabeth I, Mary II, Anne, Victoria and Elizabeth II all successfully negotiated the politics of a role that was, and is still, designed for men. Two sisters, daughters of rivals, carried on a dynasty founded on their great-grandmother's claim to the throne. Two more sisters helped overthrow their father over religion, then united three kingdoms to create the UK. Finally, two female rulers a century apart became the two longest reigning monarchs in British history. Find out how they handled marriage proposals, jealous husbands, rebellious children and secret lovers all while keeping Parliament and their country happy.

Eclipses and the Solar Eclipse of 2024 WEDNESDAY | May 8 1 - 2:30 p.m. | ED140 and ZOOM


Inside NASA: From Dream to Discovery



In 1972, when workers in Pottstown, Pennsylvania, were digging the foundations for a new development, the last thing they expected to find was a skeleton at the bottom of a well. Who the skeleton was and how it got there were two of the long-held secrets kept by the residents of Chicken Hill, the dilapidated neighborhood where immigrant Jews and




African Americans lived side by side and shared ambitions and sorrows. When the truth is finally revealed about what happened on Chicken Hill and the part the town's white establishment played in it, McBride shows us that even in dark times, it is love and community—heaven and earth—that sustain us.

Brave the Wild River. The Untold Story of Two Women Who Mapped the Botany of the Grand Canyon by Melissa Sevigny


A spellbinding adventure of two women who risked their lives to make an unprecedented botanical survey of a defining landscape in the American West, at a time when human influences had begun to change it forever.

But Hedy is also intelligent. At lavish Vienna dinner parties, she overhears the Third Reich's plans. One night in




1937, desperate to escape her controlling husband and the rise of the Nazis, she disguises herself and flees her husband's castle. She lands in Hollywood, where she becomes Hedy Lamarr, screen star. But Hedy is keeping a secret even more shocking than her Jewish heritage: she is a scientist and she has an idea that might help the country and that might ease her guilt for escaping alone—if anyone will listen to her.

FRIDAY, MAY 10

Untold Power. The Fascinating Rise and Complex Legacy of First Lady Edith Wilson by Rebecca Boggs Roberts

Contrary to recent feminist maxims, the first woman president is not alive today. In fact, she was born in 1872, and her name was Edith Bolling Galt Wilson. She hightailed her way out of Appalachian poverty and into the highest echelons of American power, and in 1919 effectively became the first woman president of the US (before women could even



vote) when her husband, Woodrow Wilson, was incapacitated. Beautiful, brilliant, charismatic, catty, and calculating, she was a complicated figure whose personal quest for influence reshaped the position of first lady into one of political prominence forever. And still, nobody truly understands who she was.
